The plan is this. We leave Washington about 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning so as to have a bit of time for fun after we get there. We will camp in a meadow near Range View Shelter (Park Service willing). We do not have use of the shelter. Meals and sleeping will be in the open. For a short shower (rain) we will retire to our cars.

The N.B.S. will provide plotting maps and charts, blankets, cots, and a panel truck to cart our gear. I am bringing a gasoline stove and a large coffee pot and the fixens.

You must bring your own food and cooking and eating utensils. You also bring whatever extra clothing and sleeping equipment you may need. It gets cold in the mountains.

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Bring your telescope for star gazing.

We also need reclining beach chairs. If anyone wishes to loan us some we would appreciate it.

We need a minimum of ten observers to make this a success.
